Mayo Clinic Investigates COVID-19 Neurological Symptoms

Mayo Clinic researchers are investigating COVID-19's neurological side effects, such as loss of smell, delirium and cognitive impairment, to determine whether being infected with COVID-19 influences development or progression of Alzheimer's disease and Alzheimer's disease-related dementias. While COVID-19 is primarily regarded as a respiratory disease, brain scans and neuropathological studies confirm brain abnormalities in some patients infected with COVID-19. In addition, a recent Mayo study revealed that approximately half of patients hospitalized with COVID-19 have elevated levels of neurofilament light in their blood. This protein is present only in neurons, which carry and transmit electrical signals throughout the nervous system, and its detection in blood indicates neuronal injury. To examine that finding further, a team led by Leonard Petrucelli, Ph.D., a Mayo Clinic

molecular neuroscientist, and James Meschia, M.D., a Mayo Clinic neurologist, is poised to investigate key questions about the effects of COVID-19 on the brain and assess longterm neurological implications of COVID-19 infection. The researchers plan to study blood neurofilament light protein; other proteins associated with Alzheimer's disease, such as tau and beta amyloid; and changes in cognition, behavior, and daily function related to neurodegenerative disorders, which may be unmasked or accelerated by COVID-19. Imaging for markers of brain neuroinflammation and beta amyloid pathology may help researchers determine whether neuroinflammation associated with COVID-19 triggers or accelerates the buildup of beta amyloid.

AOPA's You Can Fly High School Curriculum Grows

The Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association (AOPA) Foundation You Can Fly High School Aviation STEM Curriculum is quickly being adopted at schools across the country, with 322 educational institutions in 44 states using the curriculum in the 2021–2022 school year. That represents a 60% increase in the number of schools and a 22% increase in the number of states in which the curriculum will be taught compared to 1 year ago, when 200 schools in 36 states provided it for 8,000 students. Donations to the AOPA Foundation fund the curriculum, which is provided free to schools. Because of this, AOPA is reaching students from populations that are underrepresented in aviation. In the 2020-2021 school year, teachers and students from mid-high and high-poverty schools accounted for 45% and 55% of participants, respectively. In addition, 20% of the students were female, and 45% of the students were people of color. The curriculum has received national accreditation and is backed by state education departments, helping to fuel its growth. The curriculum also can count as college credit at many colleges and universities across the country.

As part of the American Rescue Plan of 2021, NIOSH received funding to deliver a national awareness and education campaign to safeguard and improve the mental health of health workers. Through this Request for Information, NIOSH seeks to gain input from partners and the public about current evidence-based occupational safety and health and other related interventions to prevent work-associated stress and improve the mental health of health workers.
