IMPORTANCE OF ACCREDITED TRAINING AND BOARD SUBJECT: CERTIFICATION IN AEROSPACE MEDICINE FOR THE GROWING COMMERCIAL SPACE INDUSTRY SUBMITTED BY: American Osteopathic College of Occupational and Preventive Medicine REFERRED TO: Committee on Educational Affairs WHEREAS, the commercial space industry continues to grow and push the envelope of human spaceflight, with more private citizens, new vehicles, new mission objectives, and operationally untested flights every year; WHEREAS, The Aerospace Medical Association passed a similar resolution on 13 January, 2024 (2022-01) and seeks AOA support of same. WHEREAS, crew and passenger safety, health, and mission success remain the highest priorities in our practice as Aerospace Medicine (AM) physicians; WHEREAS, no current requirements or standards exist for medical providers working at commercial space companies, driving the creation of unregulated and unaccredited medical training pathways and the hiring of providers untrained in Aerospace Medicine; WHEREAS, externally validated, national standards and core competencies have existed through the Accreditation Council of Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) and international equivalent-accredited Aerospace Medicine residency/fellowship programs and Specialty Boards since 1953, and are the established and recognized industry standards; WHEREAS, precedent exists per AsMA Resolution 2020-01 and AOA Policy H201-A/2021 Vital Nature of Board-Certified Physicians in Aerospace Medicine (dated June 8 and July 17, 2021, respectively) affirming the "unique" leadership roles, contributions, and advanced qualification of Aerospace Medicine professionals, and opposes all efforts to remove, reduce or replace Aerospace Medicine physician leadership in civilian, corporate or government Aerospace Medicine programs and aircrew healthcare support teams"; WHEREAS, board-certified AM specialists provide: 1) Operational experience and specific training in spacecraft systems and the health effects of microgravity
